# **Rethinking Extremism, Radicalization**

### and the 'Global War on Terror'

May 2 – 3, 2019 Le Bristol, Beirut





### **CONCEPT NOTE**

For more than a quarter of a century, the spread of terrorism in the Middle East and abroad in the wake of the rise of militant Islamist groups such as Al-Qaeda and the Islamic State (IS) has been at the center stage of policy making in and on the region. After the slow but steady downfall of Al-Qaeda and the territorial defeat of IS in Iraq and Syria, we are now at a critical point where it is necessary to rethink extremism, radicalization, and the 'Global War on Terror' in a more updated and proper context.

The Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung (KAS), in partnership with Saint-Joseph University of Beirut (USJ), will host a two-day conference on the current threat of IS and Al-Qaeda in Europe and the Middle East. In particular, the conference aims to analyze how the surge of terrorist activities in the Middle East has affected the region and its vicinity, and to discuss the abstract effects the 'Global War on Terror' has had on the perception of Islam around the world. This timely event seeks to kick off a critical debate in order to draw the right lessons from past experiences and to develop adequate policies for the future.

The event will start off by shedding light on the recent developments in the Middle East. First, it will address the transformation and future of IS in the region and assess whether there might be a genuine risk of a return or metamorphosis of the organization. The second objective is to better understand Al-Qaeda's footprint in the wider Middle East and to analyze how the group has sought to adapt itself to different environments. Third, the way extremist Islamist activities and efforts to tackle them have shaped the states and societies of the Middle East will be debated, particularly in light of the question of whether the 'Global War on Terror' has facilitated the resurgence of authoritarianism in several Arab countries.

Additionally, the conference will focus on Europe and the broader nexus between terrorism and the image of the Middle East and Islam around the world. Two panels will be devoted to terrorism and radical Islam in Europe as well as the numerous challenges that returning fighters pose to European states. Last but not least, a final expert debate will discuss whether the perceptions of Islam and the predominance of the security framework have had a negative impact in the fight against terrorism, undermining the search for inclusive political solutions to the Iraq and Syria crisis.
